# Education Aiming in the School of International Studies

The issues facing us in the 21st century are becoming extremely complex due to the rapid rise of globalization. Multiculturalism and globalization are progressing at a rapid rate and involve the global deployment of capital and large labor forces moving outside of country boundaries. Under these societal conditions, unprecedented problems such as widening disparities, environmental destruction, the immigration and refugee crises, and ethnic and cultural conflicts are happening all over the world. Furthermore, with more and more businesses moving into overseas markets, the need is greater than ever before for corporate activities that create and implement globally-minded strategies that fit the circumstances of each region. These changes have led to a growing call within society to raise global, glocal, 21st century people who have the necessary knowledge, concern, ambition, and initiative to make multiculturalism a reality. To meet these demands, as well as to succeed in international fields in regions all over the world, the School of International Studies will equip students with specialized knowledge and skills relating to multiculturalism, in addition to fostering a willingness to take on challenges, instilling them with initiative, and giving them the strength to act globally.

Mastering the strength to act globally requires a variety of abilities, such as expert knowledge of the multiculturalism seen in regions all over the world, a flair for communication, initiative, and a cooperative attitude. To put it in more concrete terms, these abilities can be summarized into the four points below.

- 1. The ability to interpret the current conditions and issues in globalizing areas from the viewpoint of multiculturalism
- 2. The ability to plan a society while taking into account the structure of existing problems (ability to select values/ability to set goals)
- 3. The ability to express one's own ideas in dialogues with others, cooperation, and negotiation (communication skills/ability to speak multiple languages)
- 4. The desire, knowledge and initiative to contribute to issues posed by multiculturalism through one's work and activities.
  - As a result, we will foster students with the strength to act globally who will go on to flourish in international fields such as the globally developing manufacturing industries and international cooperation.





## Admission Policies

We envision students who:

- possess broad and basic knowledge based on the comprehensive academic skills of a high school curriculum, with the ability to use a foreign language and to write logically.
- have an aptitude for addressing multicultural society by actively exploring the issues, demonstrating a high motivation to study, logically considering a diverse range of phenomena, and expressing what they think and feel.
- demonstrate the ability to persuasively discuss international issues, a
  high level of awareness of international issues gained from studying
  in a foreign school, a deep awareness of issues gained from working
  experience, and a strong will to continue studying for four years as a
  foreigner.
- wish to equip themselves with various foreign languages and methods of gathering, analyzing, and sharing information in order to communicate with a range of people from differing regional and cultural backgrounds.
- address the existence of a range of people with differing regional and cultural backgrounds and wish to envisage a society in which we can live together and learn from each other at the same time.
- have an interest in the various countries and regions throughout the world and who want to do their part to promote multiculturalism in globalizing regions and the rest of the world.

## Acceptance of International Students

Utsunomiya University has actively promoted the acceptance of international students from abroad. The School of International Studies has hosted the highest number of international students.

A number of international students from different regions of the world are studying a variety of disciplines together with Japanese students at Utsunomiya University. Utsunomiya University international students include four-year undergraduate students; exchange students from universities in China, Thailand, South Korea, Viet Nam, Cambodia, and Germany, among others, under student exchange agreements with Utsunomiya University; exchange students under the Japanese language and culture training program sponsored by the Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology; and exchange students under short-term student exchange programs.

## Support Services for International Students

#### **Student Tutor Program**

The Student Tutor Program will assign a Japanese student as a tutor to assist each international student at Utsunomiya University. A junior or senior student from the School of International Studies or a graduate student from the Graduate School of Regional Development and Creativity will be assigned as a student tutor to each international student for the first one or two years, depending on the length of study at the University. The tutor will assist the student in adjusting to daily and campus life soon after arriving in Japan and in the mastery of the coursework as well as in learning Japanese. International students are expected to deepen international exchange and cross-cultural understanding through interactions with their student tutors.

#### Center for International Exchange

The Center for International Exchange provides guidance and advice to international students from overseas as well as to Japanese students who wish to study abroad.

## Accommodation for Exchange Students

#### Utsunomiya University International House

International House is located 15 minutes on foot from MINE campus.

- -Address: 2980 Ishii Machi, Utsunomiya city, Tochigi 321-0912 Japan
- -Room : 55 single rooms (12.5  $\rm{m}^2$ ),3 couple rooms (37.8  $\rm{m}^2$ ),2 family rooms (56.8  $\rm{m}^2$ )
- -Facilities: Lounge, meeting room, laundry room, kitchen, shower room. In principle, international students may live at the house for half a year. It should be noted that not all applicants can be accommodated. Exchange Students are treated preferentially and are allowed to stay up to one year.

#### Utsunomiya University Dormitory (Male dormitory and Female dormitory.)

Utsunomiya University Dormitory is in the same location as International House.

The Dormitory is an accommodation for Japanese students. Some rooms are available for International students.

## **ACCESS TO THE UNIVERSITY**

The closest major airports are Narita Airport (New Tokyo International Airport) in Chiba Prefecture which receives many direct flights from abroad and Haneda Airport in Tokyo which is accessible by direct flights from other airports in Japan. At both airports, train service is available to Tokyo, from which the Super Express Train travels to Utsunomiya in less than an hour. As well, there is direct bus service to Utsunomiya that is also conveniently available from both airports.
